Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Worcester ss. To Keloris Taft and William Knowlton both of Upton in our County of Worcester and Robert Taft of Uxbridge in said County and disinterested persons, greeting. Whereas, Stephen Torrey of Woonsocket in the County of Providence and State of Rhode Island did petition the Superior Court, begun and holden at Fitchburg within and for said County of Worcester, on the second Monday of November A.D. 1868 shewing that he was seized and possessed in fee in his own right of one undivided third part of several tracts or parcels of land situate in Mendon in said County of Worcester, described as follows, to wit: The first tract contains four acres more or less and is known as the "homestead place." The second tract contains four acres more or less, and is situate on "Back Lane" so called, near said Homestead between lands now owned by Ebenezer Taft and Silas Lesure. The third tract contains sixteen acres more or less situated Westerly of said Homestead and on the Southerly of the road leading from Mendon to Uxbridge called and known as the "Training Field." The fourth tract contains eleven and three fourths acres more or less, situated in the Westerly side of "Birch Alley," so called, and is known as the "Stocomb Land." The fifth tract is woodland and contains sixteen acres more or less, and is called the "Linri look land." The sixth tract is a lot of land and dwelling house thereon, situate near the Unitarian Church and is now occupied by Seth F. Staples. The seventh and last tract is sprout land and contains seven and a half acres more or less, and is called the "Post Place." And the petitioner further represents that he holds the lands and tenements above described in common with certain other
