Homer W. Darling and Abbi C. Darling wife of said Homer in her right-of Mendon in the County of Worcester and Commonwealth of Massachusetts in consideration of twenty five hundred dollars paid by Olive Darling wife of Newbury Darling of said Mendon, the receipt whereof we do hereby acknowledge, do hereby give, grant, sell and convey unto the said Olive Darling her heirs and assigns, one undivided half part of all that certain tract or parcel of land with the buildings thereon situated in the northwesterly part of said Mendon, containing sixty acres more or less, bounded as follows, to wit: Beginning at stake and stones at the northwest corner of Henry O. Stewards land, on the easterly side of the County road, nearly opposite the house of Otis Thayer, thence by land of said Steward to the centre of Muddy Brook, thence with said brook to stake and stones at David W. Bennett's land, thence northeast by land of said Bennett to stake and stones at the eight rod road; thence northerly on the west side of said road to land formerly of J. G. Davenport; thence westerly, bounding southerly by land formerly of J. G. Davenport to land formerly owned by George Staples; thence westerly by land formerly of said Staples to the aforesaid County road; thence southerly by and with said County road to the point of beginning. Reference being had to Deeds given to Jesse F. Alderman by Benjamin Davenport and George Staples recorded in the Register of Deeds office at Worcester, said Davenport's deed recorded June 20th, 1843 Book 379 Page 340, said Staples' deed recorded June 12th, 1849, Book 449, Page 542, for a more particular description, with the privileges and appurtenances to the same belonging. To have and to hold the afore-mentioned premises to the said Olive Darling, to her sole and separate use without the intervention of a trustee free from the interference and control of her husband, and to her heirs and assigns, to her and their use and behoof forever. It being one undivided half or moiety of the same premises, conveyed to said Abbi C. Darling by Newbury
