I, Edgja M. Wordbury, widow of Charles W. Wordbury, late of Charlton, in the county of Worcester, and State of Massachusetts, make and proclaim the following, as my last will and testament.

First. It is my wish, that my body be buried between the ground of my husband and child's, in our lot in the Cemetery, at the center, in Charlton, Massachusetts.

Second. I direct that all debts and expenses, of last sickness, and funeral be paid, and if it be not already done, at the time of my death, that granite curb-stones, be placed around the lot and a suitable monument or head-stone of good marble be erected.

Third. I give the said town of Charlton, One hundred dollars in trust; the income to be used, in caring for said lot, in said Cemetery.

Fourth. I direct my executor, hereinafter named, to give to my

brother Thomas March, and to his wife, Isabella March, also to each of my nieces, and nephews, some article of use or ornament, found among my effects, as a memento.

Fifth. I give to my nephew, Calvin S. Aldrich, to his wife, Amette W. Aldrich, and to their child or children, Five hundred dollars, each.

Sixth. I give to the American Board, of Commissioners, for Foreign Missions, incorporated in Massachusetts in 1812.

"The American Home Missionary Society" formed in New York City in 1826, and the American Missionary Association of New York City, Two hundred dollars each; or if there be not as much remaining, then whatever there be, to be equally divided between them.

Seventh. If there should still be a remainder, I give the same whatever it may be, to my nephew, Calvin S. Aldrich, his wife, and child or children, to be equally divided between them.

I hereby appoint Veronic Johnson, of Charlton, Massachusetts, to be the executor of this will, or in case of his death, before it be executed, then I appoint my nephew, Calvin S. Aldrich, to be the executor of the same.
